

HEALTH PLANS

The Lewisham and N. Southwark Health Authority have just published their plans for the next III years. Over this period they are expecting a massive cut of over 10% of their budget!

At the same time the health authority is committed to improving health services for the elderly, the mentally ill, the physically disabled and the mentally handicapped who at present have inadequate health care.

To do this the health authority is planning to close New Cross Hospital in 1986 and Hither Green in 1993 and transfer Sydenham Childrens Hospital to Lewisham Hospital

The District Health Authority claims that these cuts, combined with money from other sources will enable it to develop appropriate care in the community and in smaller less institutional units while acute care is concer trated at Guy's and Lewisham.

The hospital unions are opposed to these plans, not least because they will lead to the loss of an estimated 1000 jobs !

The Lewisham and North South wark Health Campaign are totally opposed to the cuts and job losses forced on the area by spending limits but support the development of services for the elderly and the handicapped.

However, we do pay a small attendance allowance in line with D.H.S.S. regulations. We also help people to prepare for 'real work' when they are ready. For those people we give help with Job Preparation Courses and also have Group Meetings which

help people increase their selfconfidence in other ways.





THAT IS THE QUESTION FOR MANY PEOPLE

Dear SE 1.reader. Are you troubled by dogs on your estate? Many people are.

IN SEI!

It is becoming increasingly obvious that more and more dogs are being kept in flats and no one can deny that this is cruel to the dogs and cruel to the neighbours.

Are these dog owners aware that they should pay a license fee for their pets? Are they aware of TOXINA

CANIS?
Are their pets vaccinated

against distemper and rabis?

Far to many people are unaware of the cruelty they are causing their dogs by having them shut up in flats and the danger to neighbours. Some people are actually frightened of dogs and it is no good telling them not to be and that the dog is friendly when it is running round their feet and barking madly, and in any event even if it is that friendly why have they got it for protection?

Dogs in public places are supposed to be under control and on a leash, many are sent out to exercise on their own. Do you know that dogs are not allowed in childrens play areas because of TOXICANA CANIS (which can cause blindness) and that the germs from the animals faeces remain in the earth for many days?

Lastly where are these dogs exercised? mostly on the green areas around the flats which is for the use of tenants, an area where they can sit, but no-one wants to sit in an area already fouled by dogs; or along the public highway fouling it as they go.


The General Office in the Main Building is open Monday-Friday from 10am to 9pm and on Saturday mornings from 10am to 12 noon.
