





TRIG LANE HELIPORT GETS REPRIEVE!

It now looks like there will not be a public inquiry as scheduled into the Trig Lane Helibarge, moored in the Thames between Southwark and Blackfriars Bridges. The signs are that the City of London and the operators, City Heliports Ltd, have struck a deal behind closed doors. Local residents won't get a chance to make their objections known.

The City of London refused planning permission for the barge in 1984 which led the operators to lodge an appeal with the Department of the Environment. Now, following a joint proposal from City Heliports Ltd and the British Helicopters Advisory Board, the City of London had decided to reach an agreement with the operators.

The agreement will allow the heliport to operate until 7th September,1986. 7th September just happens to be the opening date of the new City of London Boys School, located next to the heliport.

The City of London appears to have forgotten about other objections such as noise, the close proximity of residential areas, safety, etc. It is an odd coincidence that the heliport is due to close when a private school is going to open while at Chambers Wharf a far busier heliport is planned right next to a state school.

Meanwhile, questions remain unanswered and the City of London authorities are playing the cards close to their chests. What will happen after September 7th to City Heliports Ltd? Will they vanish into thin air? All the City is saying is that they have received no planning applications for heliports in their area. Inevitably, if Trig Lane goes, the advocates of a heliport for Bermondsey will feel they have a better case.

Southwark Council remain opposed to helicopter operations on the riverside and are also seeking answers to questions from the City.

Downstream at Chambers Wharf, local residents have formed CHOP (Chambers Wharf Heliport Opposition People) to put the community's case at the public inquiry in April 1986 into the proposed heliport. Anyone interested in the campaign should contact Simon on 928 0711 or Maggie, 231 0916.

Youngsters With Hearts of Gold

Warm hearted youngters from North Southwark secondary schools have been using their swimming skills to help sick children. In a general swim at Rotherhithe baths earlier this year they raised £9350 for the British Heart Foundation, which was used to buy an ultra-sound scanner to help young patients at Guy's Hospital.

Nearly half the total (£4140) was clocked up by 144 swimmers from Scott Lidgett School in Drummond Rd. Their achievement was acknowledged by the British Heart Foundation who awarded the school a special shield which was presented by Simon Hughes MP.

Individual awards were also given to former Scott Lidgett pupils Steven Green and Steven Supple, fifth former Oluseun Olufunwa; Clare Tomkins from Aylwin School and Rebecca Spencer from Northbrook School who between them have raised £3500 for the Foundation in recent years.

Over 12 years Scott Lidgett pupils have raised nearly £17000 for the British Heart Foundation in events organised by the school's swimming instructor Peter Wilson.

John Fowler, Southwark's ILEA representative, said "This is a magnificent effort and shows the depth of generosity and concern that exists amongst the young people in the inner city."

AFTER THE GLC

The abolition of the GLC presents SEl residents with the awful prospect of reliving the past, a past we have been working to bury in the last 4 and a half years. Spearheaded by local action groups such as North Southwark Community Development Group, Waterloo Community Development Group Community Development Group and Coin Street Action Group, many local organizations have been able to make their voice and demands heard, often for happen by accident. A lot of work was put in prior to 1981 to make sure that if a Labour GLC was elected then critically and the control of the critical surface of the critic the first time. This didn't was elected then action would follow. It did, as the achievements show. Homes, workshops, sports facilities, Community Centres, education facilities, Parks, Nurseries and pensioners projects have appeared in the last four a half years. I do not and think it is too grand a claim to say that the quality of life for residents in SEI has improved as a result of the efforts of the Labour GLC.

The Community Areas Policy, which I have steered as Chair of the GLC Planning Committee, is mainly responsible for these projects. There are other projects such as the Bermondsey Minibus Project funded by the Transport Committee and Burgess Park funded by the Arts & Recreation

Committee. There is the very large housing improvement programme to ex-GLC estates Rockingham, Draper, Tabard, Dickens and Kipling Estates funded by the Housing Committee. The Greater London Enterprise Board on Newington Causeway is another GLC project creating and saving jobs in SEl.

In the last four and a half years as well, we have made efforts to make the Festival Hall a more popular arts centre. The fact that over a million people visit it each year now is a sure sign that we have been successful. Part of this success is due to the festivals we have held on the South Bank which many SEl residents will have visited.

It is not being alarmist to say that much of what I have out above is threatened by the abolition of the GLC. This is why we have campaigned vigorously along with many you to stop the Government's stupid and vindictive attempt to stamp out a popular elected body.

There is no joy in the predictions I am about to make, but I will stand by them. Briefly, fares will rise and bus services will get worse; traffic will increase, affecting SEl residents particularly badly; housing improvement programmes will be cut back and slow down; work on Burgess Park will practically come to a standstill: there will be no body to buy sites like Courages and Coin St and the GLC's housing role is being eliminated. The only new houses for rent built in the last 4 years in Bermondhave been built by the sey GLC

The South Bank, previously a property speculator's paradise, will again become a battleground, as the GLC role in protecting areas from development pressures is to be The work of the removed. Enterprise Board in creating jobs will be shackled by lack of funding, at a time when unemployment in SEl is up.

If it weren't for the fact that we have all been through this before it would be difficult to be optimistic. But I believe that the experience of seeing what a body like the GLC can really do and has been doing, the experience of SEl residents being involved the development of our community, the experience of that if you want knowing something to happen you can make it happen will mean that it is only a matter of time before order is restored. We can then look back on this rude interruption by the present government as an attack which led to their ultimate and deserved defeat.

TABARD ESTATE RENOVATION

Nearly 200 tenants of Tabard Garden Estate attended a public meeting at the end of November organized by the Tenants Association to hear GLC and Southwark Council proposals for the modernization of the estate.

Much work had gone on in the Tabard Tenants Steering Group hammering out the details of the modernization package. The Steering Group consists of tenants, councillors and council officers.

tenants, however, went away from the meeting with nothing. Only enough money exists under the ex-GLC Estates renovation programme to make weather-proof the exteriors of a total of 11 of Tabard's 38 blocks.

The GLC works involve renovations in two phases and the will include reroofing, repairing and cleaning exterior brickwork,



replacement of windows and renovation of staircases. Southwark council, in a separate scheme, is going to do much the same to Rochester House, one of the worst blocks on the Estate. Several tennants at the meeting complained that for five years nothing had been done about their leaking roofs.

The Chairwoman of Tabard TA, Rita Sergeant, explained the long battle to modernize the estate. The tenants lobbied Parliament earlier this year to get more resources put into the modernization of the ex-GLC estates. But they came awat empty-handed as Government has reduced the available. However, Rita doesn't exempt Southwark from blame and says that the TA is considering taking the council to court to get necessary repairs done.



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

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

NEWS FROM PARLIAMENT — Stuart Holland MP

The last few months have certainly been hectic for all MPs who represent inner city areas such as Vauxhall. The role of the police and the nature of law and order have become major political issues for us all. No-one condones violence whoever it is directed against, indeed most of us know that crime particularly affects the oldest, poorest and weakest in society. However we need to be careful not to listen to those who advocate simplistic answers to these problems. Since 1979 the number of police has increased by 40% yet the number of crimes has also increased by 40%. What is evident is that the police need to be representative of the community they are policing. Many people, black and white, feel increasingly alienated from a police force which is remote and unrepresentative both in terms of where they live and their concern over local issues that affect us most. This is a situation which needs urgent attention.

On other issues in SEl, I have in association with Waterloo Action Centre, been bringing to public attention the poor staffing levels at local DHSS office at Wedge House, Blackfriars and

the resultant poor service to those in need of benefit. This is a scandalous situation which is unfortunately common throughout the country. I am pleased to see that Civil Service unions have now launched a national campaign to highlight the appalling problems of inadequate numbers of staff and long delays that exist in DHSS

With other benefits I was pleased to be able to to help a local Housing Association who were experiencing considerable difficulties in receiving Housing Benefit payments it's eligible members. Housing Benefit has caused enormous problems for all local councils since this government passed on this responsibility to them in 1982. Indeed in nearby Tory controlled Croyden, a so-called model of efficiency, the local council has built up a massive backlog of 22000 claims! Thankfully Lambeth has now put forward proposals to deal with it's problems of Housing Benefit and I expect to see major improvements in the delivery of it's service.

Nationally the government is pushing ahead with it's disasterous plans for the abolition of the GLC. Apart from

everything else these proposals are going to cause major problems for the shops and traders in Lower Marsh who will lose a large part of their custom. Who says the Conservatives are the party


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

Many reades of SEl will be in receipt of benefits from the local DHSS office at Wedge House, Blackfriars Rd. They will also probably be worried at their inability to contact the office in the afternoons, either by telephone or in For those who are person. unaware of the situation, supplementary benefit claimants making telephone enquiries after 2pm are invited to leave an answerphone message which is typed out the following morning. Personal callers to the office often find that it is closed to the public any time after lpm.

The trades union representatives in the office would like to inform your readers that we are very concerned about the poor service our office provides despite the hard work and the long hours put in by our members.

We know only too well the hardship caused by late and inaccurate payment of benefit. However, the numbers of Supplementary Benefit claimincreased from ants have about 7000 in 1979 to over 12000 now. During this period the number of staff in the office has actually been reduced.

Our problems are made worse staff going sick due to by pressure of work and staff leaving for lower paid jobs in a more relaxed environment. Staff have sometimes had to remain in the office until 6:30pm to deal with





THE COIN STREET **COURAGE'S SITES**

TWO COMMUNITY **VICTORIES**

Work is now well under way on two schemes designed to bring homes and jobs back to the South Bank area. Both will bring new life to an area which has lost much of its housing and local industry over the years. More importantly, they both represent a victory for the local people who fought so hard to put the interests of their communitites first.

Coin Street

After forty years of blight, a decade of effort and two Public Inquiries, the residents of Waterloo, backed by the GLC, Lambeth and Southwark Councils and the Greater London Enterprise Board, have finally fought off plans for a massive development in the Coin Street area. These plans included a wall of offices a third of a mile long. In its place, they are building something which meets the needs of local people.

The new scheme will provide nearly 400 new homes, jobs for 1200 people, a new park and a riverside walkway, a Thames museum, cafes, shops and a pub. Demolition work has now nearly finished, and work on the new housing will start early in 1986.

Courage's

When the old Courage's bottling plant closed in 1981, there was great pressure for yet more offices on this site. Instead, the efforts of the local community, supported by the GLC and Southwark Council, have been rewarded. Southwark Council are already building the first of up to 120 new homes and 37 sheltered flats, while the GLC are providing a further 26 homes in renovated historic buildings. 24 workshops and 6 large industrial units are also being built with money provided by the GLC's Industry and Employment programme. The first of the renovated houses are now ready for occupation, and the whole project should be finished in 1987.





The reason people get away with less than civil responses is because people like you and me lack the confidence to make a fuss. Don't be their institutions. Be superior, you help pay their wages. Challenge the professionals!




