Claimants facing DHSS delays

Claimants, advice centre workers and supporters of the 'Delay Campaign' picketed Southwark DHSS at Wedge House in Blackfriars Road last month in protest at the long delays many people are experiencing with their claims for supplementary benefit.

The Campaign has been organised by advice centres in Lambeth and Southwark, including Waterloo Action Centre and Blackfriars Advice Centre. Advice workers are finding that more and more of their time is spent helping clients who have been waiting for weeks to hear from their local DHSS about supplementary benefit claims. Because of these delays, many people

are suffering hardship and are having to do without everyday essentials.

A lack of staff as well as high staff turnover is one of the problems causing the delays. As a result of government cuts, it has become obvious that there aren't enough DHSS staff to deal with the demands on its services. Of the 169 staff at Wedge House to deal with 12-13,000 claimants, only 58% have more than 12 months experience of the job.

Advice Centres have been threating legal action against the DHSS because of the delays in settling claims and as a result some improvements have been made. The Advice Centre in the Blue in Rotherhithe have threatened legal action on behalf of 82 of their clients. These clients have waited 3 months on average to have their claims settled whereas government regulations say that this period should be 14 days at the most. Five claimants had to wait 30 weeks or more!

According to advice centre workers, more resources need to be provided so more staff can be taken on to provide a decent service for claimants. In the meantime, they intend to keep up their pressure on the DHSS. Coach Station threat to the South Bank still remains

The threat to the South Bank of a new coach terminal is still hanging over Lambeth's head. London Regional Transport (LRT) has been examining potential sites for a major new coach station to replace Victoria Coach Station and shortlisted two sites - one in Paddington and the other at the foot of Vauxhall Bridge. Recently it decided that the new terminal should be built in Paddington, on a site adjoining the M40 Westway road.

It so happens though that this is the turf of the Conservatives and the local Westminster Tories went running up in arms to the Transport Minister David Mitchell protesting against the proposal. He in turn got cold feet, worried about the electoral damage to his party if the new coach station went ahead in Paddington.

So what has Mr Mitchell decided to do? He's going to hold an inquiry into the merits of a single coach terminal compared with a number of smaller terminals dispersed around London. Readers, mindful of the rotten stink of hypocrisy, might hold their noses and recall that this was the same Transport Minister Mr Mitchell who rejected the calls of the Waterloo community and Lambeth Council for a public inquiry into British Rail's proposal to site the Channel Tunnel rail terminal at Waterloo Station, which will bring far more potentially damaging consequences.

The threat to the South Bank though still remains. Given the opposition to the new coach station in Paddington, the Minister could still make a political decision to site it at Vauxhall Bridgefoot. Lambeth Council is vigorously opposed. Councillor Bob Colenutt, Chair of Lambeth's Planning Committee, sees the issue as a potentially divisive one with two communities,


child with a disability through this scheme. People look after their 'link' child for periods of time from a few hours to overnight stays.

Paddington and Vauxhall, being played off against each other. Bob thinks that the a new coach station shouldn't be sited anywhere in Central London where local communities are already on the defensive against land developments out of their

The effects of the proposed new coach station would be serious for either of the two sites put forward by LRT. Vauxhall already suffers from heavy traffic and the new station would bring in 3,250 coaches daily, many of then at night. It would also mean greater pollution, congestion on the Victoria Underground Line, property speculation due to a greater demand for hotels and bed and breakfast accomodation and increased illegal parking.

According to Bob Colenutt, "Vauxhall Bridgefoot is the largest vacant site in Lambeth and it has tremendous potential for benefiting local people. We cannot allow it to be used for a scheme which would spell environmental disaster for the area. A single major terminal is certainly not the best solution for London."

Soup Run for the Homeless

The idea of the Soup Run to feed the homeless was thought of by Nannette French. Originally she came to Melior St Church in Weston St to help the homeless in that area. After a while she set up a soup kitchen in Melior Street after discovering that the homeless who live in lodging houses and hostels around the area could not get any hot food or tea or coffee after 6pm.

But people reading this article who are brave enough to have something to do with the homeless, say on a soup run, would know that there are many different kinds of people who are in a state of semi starvation trying to get a meal at a reasonable enough cost which helps them spin out their social security allowance.

These young men and women believe that by coming south they may get a job a set up a decent way of life. They turn to drink after spending most of their lives at hostels and lodging houses and under arches or at Festival Hall in Waterl∞ - cardboard city as the people on the soup run

The homeless come to the Soup Run for a sandwich and as much hot tea as you can drink while there is tea left in the ten-gallon urn. About 20% of those who come are young. About 40% of the group who need food are quite smart and seem to keep clean no matter how long they have been homeless. And that is what they are the people who live in

the hostels - homeless. And no matter how hard some people try to change the situation, it is getting

So, the young and old come to us and just recently there are even families coming just to get a sandwich. Sometimes the people who contribute the food send along some sausege rolls or cakes for these people who are in a state of poverty which people who have a job just do not seem to notice.

Of the people who help to give out the food and tea, they come from near and far, from Kingston to Westminster, seven days a week, every night under the arches in Crucifix Lane. J E Moyse

Channel Tunnel Terminal at Waterloo Select Committee says yes -

now for the Lords

The House of Commons Select Committee, examining the Channel Tunnel Bill,
"generously" decided to spend two whole days, at the end of October, hearing petitions from the Association of Waterloo Groups, and other local community organisations and individual Waterloo residents protesting about the decision to site the Channel Tunnel Passenger Rail terminal at Waterloo Station.

Throughout the hearings, attempts were made by the Tories who are in the majority on the Select Committee to rush the proceedings and to muzzle and intimidate petitioners. They changed the order of hearing petitions, so that people who turned up at their previously appointed times were unable to give evidence. Nevertheless. Waterloo presented a watertight case explaining why the area was completely unsuitable for a major airport style development. We weren't surprised though when the Select committee delivered its verdict: that Waterloo should remain the site for the passenger terminal.

However, Nick Raynsford (Labour MP for Hammersmith & Fulham), a member of the Committee, produced a minority report, highlighting the Select Committee's failure to deal satisfactorily with issues like adequate Tunnel safety standards and objections to the Waterloo passenger terminal.



The Bill is nearly through the House of Commons where it is unlikely to be amended in any major way which would benefit Waterloo people. Our fight will then continue in the House of Lords, which will be hearing petitions submitted by local people and groups. It is important that as many local people as possible join in the campaign and petition the House of Lords.

Time off for tea

On Friday 24th October, women shopping in The Blue in Bermondsey were surprised to see a large tea trolley serving free tea and biscuits. They were asked to 'take time off' and hundreds of women did just that, putting down their shopping and taking 5 minutes off to have a cup of tea.

The reason for the tea stall was that 24th October is 'TIME OFF FOR WOMEN DAY'. It is held for two reasons, to celebrate the women's strike held 11 years ago in Iceland, which literally brought the whole country to a standstill, and to pressure the government to implement the United Nations decision that all unpaid women's work should be included in the calculation of a country's Gross National Product. That is, housework and mothering should be counted (and paid) as the real work that it is.

Southwark's Environment Programme

Southwark Council has recently published 'Brightening up your Neighbourhood, the story of the Southwark Environment Programme'. It tells the story of some of the schemes carried out by the Council together with community groups to transform derelict or under-used sites throughout the borough.

Of particular interest to SE1 residents will be projects in Cathedral, Chaucer and Abbey Wards. This area suffers from a lack of Open Space and is squeezed by office developments and heavy traffic. All of these problems were recognised in the Council's North Southwark Plan which said that derelict land should be developed with the community for play areas, gardens or areas of natural vegetation. The Southwark Environment Programme is putting these proposals of the Plan into effect.

In North Southwark, there have been 5 areas of environmental improvements covered by the Programme. The Tower Bridge Road area, where new coloured brick paving has been laid, cycle racks provided and the pavements extended. This has brightnend up a once drab

corner. The Rockingham Estate where there are large numbers of young children, benefited from having a site vacant for three years made into a community park where kids can now play.

In central Bermondsey, residents now have a new community hall - Bermondsey Village Hall - with the surrounding area landscaped as a natural park.

Copperfield St Garden was first laid out in 1958 on the site of part of All Hallows Church, which was bombed and partially demolished during the war. In 1975, Southwark cathedral wanted to change the use of the site but local residents campaigned to to keep it as a public open space and gathered a large petition to support their case. They won the day and the garden remains. Southwark has contributed to upgrading the gardens and cuts the grass, but other maintenance is carried out voluntarily by local residents like Charlie Sainsbury.








PUBLIC HAZARDS NO. 2

It was reported to us by an elderly woman. She tripped over it on her way to the 'Pensioners Pop-in' at the Borough Community Centre on Tuesday 4th November. Luckily she wasn't hurt. We reported it the same day to Southwark Council's Highways Department who said they would get an Inspector down to look at it. One month later, as we go to press, it still hasn't been fixed. Come on Public Works Department, please do your duty.



Lost jobs are grist to speculator's mill

Soaring land and property prices, regarded by the LDDC as a measure of it's "success", are driving jobs out of Docklands. Vogan food importers and packagers on Mill St, SEl, the last major industrial operative in the immediate area, is moving out of London sometime next year. Why? Vogan is a subsidiary of Elders, the Australian multinational brewing and commodities monopoly. Elders own the freehold of the site, the value of which has rocketed due to the adjacent luxury housing developments such as New Concordia Wharf and over St Saviours Dock at Butlers Wharf.

In what amounts to little more than old-fashioned asset stripping, Elders have decided to cash in on the site value and have sold out for an undisclosed but substantial sum to property developers Rosehaugh. A planning application for the conversion of the building to 67 flats has just been submitted to the LDDC, which tolls the death knell for industrial jobs in this area of North Southwark. <u>SEl</u> readers will not need reminding that the unemployment rate in Bermondsey stands at 28% and it is industrial jobs which are needed to bring this down.

The irony is that Vogan invested millions of pounds in new equipment with assistance from Southwark Council only three or four years ago. A spokesman for Vogan said that relocation was not expected. When the investment was made Mill St was part of an Industrial Development area and the management had visions of industry returning to the area. The viabilty of the firm was confirmed in a recent report, Manufacturing in Southwark by the Southwark Trade Union Support Unit.

Occurences like this are taking place all over Docklands, giving the lie to the claim by the Tories that the LDDC is creating jobs. Vogan is moving to Cambridgeshire, which means that not only will local jobs be lost negotiations are going on now with the TGWU - but there will be a knock on effect on the already run down local economy. Vogan also used water freight to bring in raw materials. Whilst local communities and progressive authorities are pushing to get more freight back onto the river and off London's congested roads, the LDDC are overseeing the death of the very firms which are needed keep the river trade alive.
